We delved into the following topics through observation, nature walk, discussion, and various art projects:


- Differences between plants and animals
- Types of plants (trees, shrubs, herbs, climbers and creepers)
- Parts of a plant
- Photosynthesis
- Life cycle of a plant
- What do plants need to survive?

It was so gratifying to hear our children's giggling and laughter along the nature

walk, now and then they would exclaim, "Look, I have found a dandelion!" "Wow! That flower is so beautiful!" Each one of our students and staff has planted some green bean seeds in a small cup and laid them out on our nature table. Every day, our little ones would observe the seeds and noticed with great excitement that the seeds gradually sprouted out into seedlings! We then planted the seedlings into our garden, and hope that next year we could harvest some green beans! ©











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#### Character Education – Creativity

In March, our children learned what means to be creative and they have amazed us with all their imaginations in their daily conversations as well as their beautiful artwork!

#### Language Learning

In a multi-lingual environment, our children have been exposed to English, Chinese and Spanish languages. Now that they have had some initial experience with the Chinese phonetics and characters, we have adopted a different approach in our Chinese

and Spanish language teaching. Instead of learning the vocabularies aligned with our monthly theme, we have been learning daily conversational Chinese and Spanish since the beginning of March.

We have also been cultivating in our children a love for book reading. Apart from circle and story times, we also read books before naptime every day. In a Montessori classroom, our little ones have the freedom to take a break from working and choose a book to read at their own pace. We are so delighted to see that our children love books! 
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### Montessori Wisdom

### Teaching of the Child

The child needs many experiences to support readiness to read and to write. The child needs to have performed many exercises of practical life. The use of practical life exercises aids in the perfecting of the eye-hand movement and coordination. Thus in scrubbing the table from left to right and back, the eyes are following the movement of the hands.

The child needs to develop a good visual span. Many slow readers have learned to read with bad habits and one of the main reasons children read slowly may be because of their limited visual span. Slow readers or





The child must be able to listen well and have good listening habits. The three year old has the ability to hear four times as well as the adult. By the time the child is four years old, this ability has already begun to decrease, and by five the child is most adept at tuning out the sounds he doesn't wish to hear, most decidedly those voices which he finds annoying or which commend him to do things he may not wish to do. Very often those who do not hear most often do not listen. Children can be taught to be better listeners. Listening has to be interesting so the child wants to listen. Auditory games should be played in the classroom.

#### **Montessori Quotes & Manifestations**

A child who looks at, recognizes, and touches the letters as if he were writing is prepared at one and the same time for reading and writing.

Touching the letters and looking at them at the same time fixes their images more quickly because of the cooperation of the senses. Later the two will be separated: seeing will be employed in reading and touching in writing. According to their different types, some learn how to read first and others how to write.
